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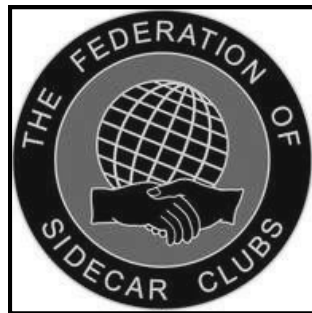

EGM at 2025 FoSC Annual Rally

Update to the proposed changes to the constitution to be discussed during the EGM (changes in bold):

Clause 11. ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING (AGM)

A. The purpose of the AGM will be:

- I. **Reports and Accounts – presentation thereof**
- II. **Proposed changes to the Constitution - discussion and vote**
- III. **Nominations for Office - discussion and vote**

These three items will constitute the Standing Agenda.

B. The AGM shall be held at the Annual Rally.

C. The Old Committee shall remain in post, to run the current Annual Rally. The newly elected committee shall take charge at the end of the current Annual Rally.

D. Only matters on the **Final Agenda** may be debated and voted on unless two thirds of the votes present decide otherwise.

E. Any member may propose AGM motions or make nominations for office as an individual or representing any group of FoSC members approved by the FoSC.

F. Late nominations may be accepted at the discretion of the Chairman.

G. The following periods before and after the AGM shall be adhered to:

- i. **At least 40 days before – The Secretary should receive nominations for office and changes to the Constitution for inclusion in the Final Agenda.**
- ii. **21 days before – The Membership will be sent the Final Agenda, Officers' Reports, Audited Accounts and any other relevant papers.**
- iii. **60 days after – the Membership shall be sent Minutes of the AGM.**

Clause 16. Finance

C. The financial year shall end on the 15th June.

I. Should the FoSC be wound up, any remaining assets shall be distributed to such motorcycle/sidecarring related Charities, Causes, Organisations as determined by the NEC taking into consideration any beneficiaries proposed by the members.

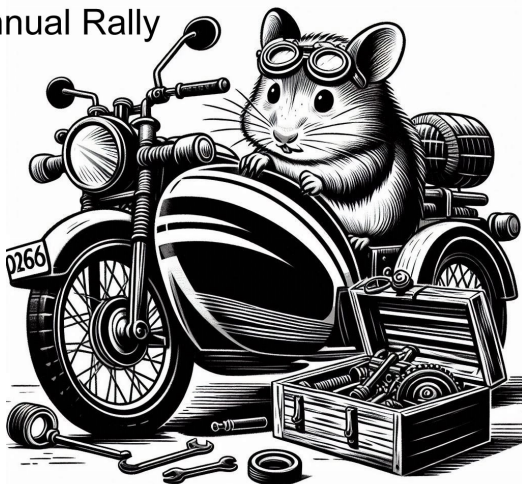

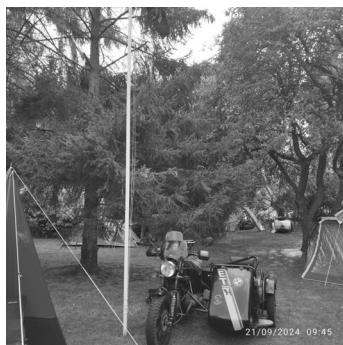
EPSC are back

The History of Jumbo

In 1961, Jumbo was created by David Cooper who worked for Motorcycle Industry Association at Stanley House in Coventry. He wanted to show that “mods and rockers” weren't all bad and decided to create a group where motorcyclists were able to take children with special needs out to specific venues across the West Midlands to start with; the first run being Dudley Zoo.

In 1962; as everyone seemed to enjoy Dudley Zoo, it made sense for the second run to be at this venue again. Little did anyone know that 'Jumbo' would be born and it was all from meeting an elephant called Jumbo. Dudley Zoo became one of the 'go-to' run hotspots for a few years after,

In 1967; as the charity started to grow, it was decided that Stanley House was too small for our base so moved to a carpark in Solihull. Little did anyone know just how big Jumbo was going to get over the next few decades.

In 1973; growing even more, the next base was at Chelmsley Wood Hospital grounds where we camped there for a number of years. During this time, Jumbo visited different venues such as Black Country Museum, Ragley Hall and Twycross Zoo where the children and of course the adults all enjoyed themselves.

By this time, bikers were coming from all over the country and Europe; Holland, Belgium, Germany and France to name but a few. Due to the size of the run, we even had police escorts when travelling to and from the venues, isn't it nice when you can go through a red light without getting a ticket?! We also had solo marshals to help the police guide us in the right direction and keep the convoy together.

In 1986; Jumbo celebrated its 25th anniversary in one of their favourite hot-spots and where it all started, Dudley Zoo. Each Jumbo member received a silver spoon consisting of either a bike and sidecar or a solo motorcycle. Has anyone still got theirs?

In 1991; Jumbo celebrated its 30th anniversary at Coombe Abbey. Each Jumbo member received an elephant keyring.



In 1997; with the impending changes at Chelmsley Wood Hospital, Jumbos base moved to the Birmingham Civil Service Social Club in Elmdon. Does anyone remember seeing the aeroplanes coming in to land over the end of the field towards Birmingham airport? What a sight to see?!

Jumbo visited Elvaston Castle, Drayton Manor and The American Adventure until the year 2000 as the charity mixed it up for their 40th anniversary.

In 2000; the Jumbo run was held at Butlins in sunny Skegvegas (Skegness for those people who don't know!!) where we went on a ride around the local area, unfortunately didnt have time to try the local cuisine of fish and chips!! Each Jumbo member received a cup and saucer to celebrate its 40th year running.

In 2008; due to the expansion of Birmingham airport, Jumbo had to move bases to Coleshill Football Club. This was a smaller venue than we were used to however we learnt to accommodate and stayed for a few years. The clubhouse was small but cosy and had some fantastic nights together dancing the night away.

In 2011; Jumbo celebrated its half a century anniversary (wow, how time flies when you're having fun!!). Each member this year received a commemorative plate.

Just like old times; we ventured to where we knew and went to Drayton Manor Theme Park.

In 2013; due to a change in committee members, we moved to Landrover Social Club for our base. Unfortunately, after this year the police decided they wouldn't be able to escort us to and from venues which caused a decrease in the number of participants for the run.

If only we had some friends that read this magazine to help us in this year's run??!!

In 2019 and subsequently 2020; Covid struck meaning no Jumbo runs. It was a daunting time as we really didn't know how or if Jumbo would survive.

In 2024; we finally were able to celebrate our 60th anniversary, better late than never!! What's the best way to celebrate this milestone we hear you say?? Well it was Cadbury's World of course!!!

This year we are moving our base again to Birch Coppice Miners Social Welfare Centre. This is a super venue with plenty of outdoor space and hoping that everyone will enjoy themselves with the run/day out to Conkers.

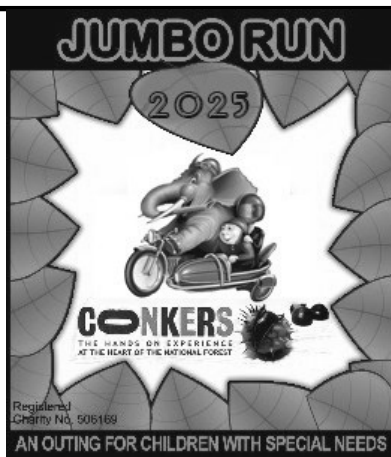

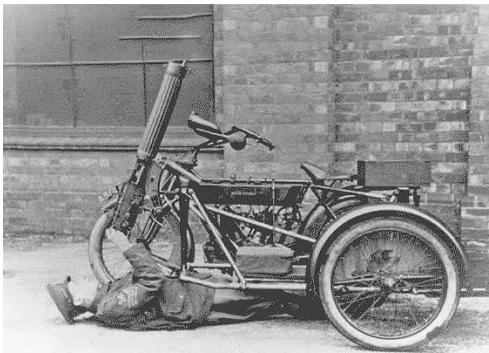

I found an interesting snippet in "The Dragon Motorcycle Rally" book by C.A.Morgan (2011) about the Oxfordshire Sidecar Club and wondered if any of the Fed's members could remember or had heard about the clubs "brew-up and thaw-out station near the Oxford by-pass"? It was set up in the 1960s on a Sunday afternoon with home going Dragon rallyists dropping in to warm up and have a "last natter and joke together." The book quotes the sidecar secretary, Roger Green saying that on one year "we got rid of 500 rolls and 28lb of sausages." The club were lucky enough to know a friendly farmer who allowed them to set up shop on a short stretch of private track. The farmer also lent the club "a redundant milk churn as a water tank and storing the gear in his barn."

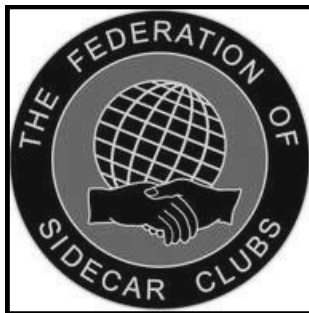

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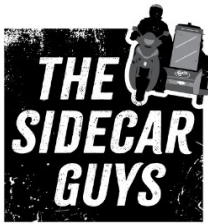
